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Job Interview Skills Earn Career Tech Student Silver Award at National Leadership Conference

TRAVERSE CITY, Mich. – Understanding the right – and wrong – things to say in a job interview can be the deciding factor in whether a person is hired for the position. There are likely few recent high school graduates who know that better than Ben McGuire, who attended the Business Careers program at Northwest Education Services (North Ed) Career Tech.

The Job Interview contest is part of FCCLA's "STAR" events – or Students Taking Action with Recognition. They must also prepare a portfolio and job application. To participate in the national contest, participants must also be top finishers in state-level competitions.

According to FCCLA, students reported learning a variety of skills by participating in the Job Interview event, including self-confidence, leadership, public speaking, responsibility, time management, and communication, observation and writing skills.

To prepare students for seeking employment after graduation, Career Tech hosts annual mock job interviews with Career Tech instructors and other North Ed staff, which allows students the opportunity to fine-tune their interview skills. Each spring, Career Tech also hosts a career fair featuring hundreds of regional employers, providing students an opportunity to network and discover potential career paths. In addition to a job board for students and recent graduates, Career Tech also offers placement services to help students obtain work experience, job shadowing opportunities and mentorships.
